# 30th Annual Lawyers Association Black history Month Dinner—Honoring Judge Theodore McMillian: A Legacy of Courage, Civility and Dedication

The 30th Annual Black History Month Dinner, hosted by the Lawyers Association, was a night of inspiration, reflection and celebration. This year's keynote address was delivered by distinguished guest speaker, Missouri Court of Appeals, Eastern district Judge Renee Hardin-Tammons, who delivered a powerful address that honored the legacy of Judge Theordore McMillian, the event's namesake (and first guest speaker), and underscored the enduring importance of diversity, courage and dedication to purpose in the legal profession, particularly in times of great difficulty. Key to navigating difficult times, instructed Juge Hardin-Tammons, was to "remain faithful to your purpose and hopeful for the future."

Judge Hardin-Tammons reminded the audience that Judge McMillian's journey was not an easy one, but was marked with a purpose to "be somebody someday," as was quoted from the Herbert Brewster poem. Judge McMillian's story is not just one of professional excellence, it is it a testament to resilience in face of adversity. Born in 1919 in St. Louis, the great-grandson of a slave, Judge McMillian grew up in humble circumstances as the eldest of ten siblings. Despite economic hardship, he excelled academically, earning degrees in mathematics and physics from Lincoln University before pivoting to law due to racial barriers that delayed his admission to medical school by five years.

After graduating first in his law school class from Saint Louis University, he faced the painful reality that downtown St. Louis law firms refused to hire him because of his race. Undeterred, he opened his own firm, later became the first African American assistant circuit attorney and eventually the first African American

judge on the Missouri Court of Appeals. His rise through a number of other "firsts" culminated when President Jimmy Carter appointed him to the Eighth Circuit of Appeals, another historic accomplishment as its first African American justice. Judge Hardin-Tammons emphasized what history may obscure from a story like this, and that is that Judge McMillian "had to be courageous to reach the heights he did" in the time in which he lived.

Judge McMillian's impact extended far beyond his own success. He championed equal protections for children, advocated for juvenile justice reform, and worked tirelessly to improve community treatment programs and family courts. His judicial philosophy was rooted in fairness, as seen in his powerful dissenting opinions that pushed for justice beyond mere technicalities. His opinions shaped hostile work environment law under Title VII and advanced protections against racial discrimination in jury selection well before the landmark Baston v. Kentucky decision.

Judge Hardin-Tammons emphasized that Judge McMillian's legacy carries a profound lesson for today's lawyers who find themselves in a world much like the one faced by Judge McMillian. Her reminder to us all was to face today's struggles in the same way that Judge McMillian faced them, "with a dogged determination and drive,

dedicated to serving others." In a world still fraught with division and challenges, his example reminds us that we must engage with our work not just with skill, but "with courage and civility." She urged attendees to embody his tenacity, to advocate for justice with conviction and the foster diversity in the legal profession, not simply as an idea, but as an imperative for a just society.

She reminded us all of the song sang in the Baptist church, "trouble don't last always!" She challenged us all to remember that "hope is the feeling of wanting something to happen and in thinking that could happen." Her challenge? She summed it up as follows: "I challenge you. I encourage you. I admonish you, to keep hoping!"

The dinner was more than a commemoration to the example of Judge McMillian—it was a call to action to all of us. As Judge Hardin-Tammons concluded, she challenged every lawyer in attendance to continue the work Judge

McMillian started to navigate contentious times with integrity, serve their communities with passion, and keep hope alive even in the face of unprecedented adversity and challenges to the rule of law.

The Lawyers Association of St. Louis and the Mound City Bar Association have, for three decades, upheld the spirit of this event, the brainchild of former president and Award of Honor winner, Mr. Leonard Cervantes, celebrating the trailblazers who have paved the way and inspiring the next generataion to build upon that foundation. In honoring Judge McMillian, we honor not only his memoriy but also the ongoing mission of ensuring that justice is fair, fearless, and accessible to all.

Judge McMillian's life is a testament to the power of perseverance. His story serves as a reminder that when we meet adversity with determination, when we champion justice with courage, and when we serve with purpose, we create a legacy that endures beyond our years.

At the end of her remarks, Judge Hardin-Tammons asked all in attendance who could to rise to their feet, a

literal call to action. She asked all of us to join our hands and repeat after her the simple, powerful message: "Working together, we can make the world a better place." Those in attendance left the evening feeling more connected to one another, and more importantly, empowered to carry out the message of the night, with courage and conviction.

# Ken Vuylsteke Receives 2025 Award of Honor

April 4, 2025. Officially "Kenneth K. Vuylsteke Day" in the City of St. Louis. Unofficially, despite a downpour outside, there was an outpouring of effusive praise for Ken, his support for this organization and his career as a lawyer and a citizen, inside the MAC Downtown. Each year since 1946, the Lawyer Association of St. Louis has presented its most prestigious accolade, the Awrad of Honor, to a member of the trial bar whose career exemplifies the highest ideas of the legal profession. This year, The Lawyers Association was proud to recognize Ken as its recipient.

As a practicing plaintiff's attorney for more than four decades, Ken has built an extraordinary career marked by service, advocacy, professionalism, and generosity. From his early days as a young trial lawyer, as his remarks revealed, taking a lot of hard knocks with many difficult losses, to his ongoing unwavering ethics, and a steadfast commitment to uplifting the profession and its practioners.



Ken was "roasted" by a few of his friends. Matt Padberg, (Award of Honor Recipient—2017), served as the master of ceremonies, and Sara Schuett, Executive Director of MATA, Peter Dunne (Award of Honor Recipient—2023), and William Thomas also spoke. The "Dogtown Tenors" performed a tribute song, "Toasted Ravioli," in honor of Ken's departed friend, Charlie Gitto, whom he would join for lunch in his downtown restaurant. A few laughs were had, mostly at Ken's expense, and his remarks recognized past recipients, and the many special people in the audience who helped him along the way.

Perhaps most touching were the remarks Ken reserved for his wife, Teri, and his family, including his brothers and son, who joined him at his table. Ken dedicated the award to the man who he said "deserved it," his long-time partner, lim Fox

Ken's history as a lawyer is immutably intertwined with the Lawyers Association. To know Ken is to know someone who deeply believes in mentoring and investing in others. From the moment he joined the Lawyers Association as a young attorney, Ken has been a visible and vocal supporter of new lawyers. His legacy as a mentor is etched into the careers of countless attorneys, on both sides fo the courtroom, who benefited from his encouragement, counsel, and example, and who he recognized that night from Dave Zevon to Ted Pashos.

Ken's leadership has been equally impactful. He served as President of the Association in 2016-17, during which he presided over the 60th Annual Gridirion Show. Ken, of course, has been a contributor to the show, and also a subject of many jokes and jabs at the event. Under his leadership, the Association introduced the now-customary "Silver Platter" sponsorship for the Gridiron, a legacy initiative that continues to support Gridiron rehearsals and cast meals by seeking sponsors of all past presidents. Each year, Ken and his firm have contributed as Highstepper-level sponsors, ensuring that the quality and tradition of the Gridiron endures.

Ken's contributions to the Association extend far beyond formal titles. He has served on the Award of Honor Selection Committee an unprecedented thirteen times, hosted and spoken at CLE programs (including a memorable event held in the City Courts Building's jury assembly room), and sponsored nearly every event the Association has held. Whether addressing the bench and bar at Judicial Appreciation or remembering our departed colleagues at the Memorial Service, Ken has remained a steady and respected voice in the Association's mission.

Ken's service is not confined to this Association. As a longtime member and past President of the Missouri Association of Trial Attorneys (MATA), Ken has fought tirelessly to defend Missouri's civil justice system. He has worked to preserve the Missouri Plan for judicial selection, oppose harmful "tort reform," and protect the constitutional right to a trial by jury. He has frequently advised lawmakers on issues affecting injured parties and their access to justice, helping

ensure that the legal system remains open to those most in need.

This deep sense of justice also animates his legal work. Ken is known as one of the Missouri's most respected plaintiff's trial lawyers, recognized early in his career with the Lon O. Hocker Award. Practicing in a small firm, often against much larger adversaries, Ken has achieved remarkable results for his clients, results won not by flashy tactics, but through tireless

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preparation, compassion, and advocacy. His reputation is one of integrity: a handshake is all you need.

Ken's achievements also extend into academia and public service. He has taught at both St. Louis University and Washington University law schools, as well as in the medical school on the subject of medical ethics. His work has been published in leading medical and legal journals, and he served as Commissioner on the Missouri Commission on Patient Safety.

Equally important are the contributions few ever see. Ken has intervened to help individuals denied urgent medical care by insurance companies. He has guided grieving families through unimaginable hardship. He has offered time, money, and comfort to people with no means to repay him. And he has done all of this quietly, without any desire

for recognition or thanks.

As the Association celebrated this year's Award of Honor recipient, it was in recognition of a career defined not just by courtroom victories, but by character, service, and heart. Ken Vuylsteke represents everything this Award was created to honor. He is not only a gifted trial lawyer and tireless advocate for the civil justice system, but also a man whose daily actions elevate those around him.

Please join us in congratulating Kenneth K. Vuylsteke, recipient of the 2025 Award of Honor, and in thanking him for his enduring contributions to the law, this Association, and our community. As I said that night, "here's to Kenny!" ("HeHe!").


